# Announcing *The Jerry Katz Park21 Fund*: A Community Effort in Support of Park21

ike many Park parents, you may have heard about "Park21" in the hallways or on the fields or read about "strategic plan" initiatives in the Park Parent. Perhaps you helped set the foundation for Park21 by participating in a parent focus group, but haven't heard the latest update. Or maybe Park21 hasn't reached your radar screen yet. Regardless of how much

you've heard about Park21, be prepared to hear a great deal more in the coming months as we bring our community up to speed and work to engage everyone in this great plan.

#### **PARK21 DEFINED**

Park21 has been guiding Park's Board of Trustees, faculty and administration since early 2011. The spirit behind the plan is to make Park a faster and more nimble - yet still thoughtful and data-driven - innovator and leader, seeking out best practices in education wherever they might be, around the corner or across the globe, and bringing them to our classrooms. Park21 offers innovation to students across all grades, with a special focus on 21st century skills in math, science, technology, faculty leadership, faculty collaboration and professional development, and expanded global perspective in service learning. The School is seeking to raise \$10 million in endowment to fund these initiatives. During the "quiet phase" of this gift drive Park has raised \$6 million toward the \$10 million goal.

Another exciting piece of Park21 involves purchasing eight acres next door to Park that belong to Nancy and Kim Faulkner '45. The Faulkner family has been an incredible friend to the school, donating 14 acres of land on Goddard Avenue in 1967, and another 12 acres in 1980. This new Faulkner property provides a muchneeded opportunity to Park. Under Brook-

line zoning laws, the school cannot build further on our existing acreage. As Park's needs grow for new science, art, athletic, or after school space, or for innovations yet to come, we cannot meet any of these possible needs without more land. Purchasing this property will allow Park the flexibility to expand as future needs arise. During the "quiet phase" of this gift drive, Park has raised almost \$3 million toward the \$6.5 million needed to fund the purchase.

His dedication to students and their families, tireless efforts to enhance the classroom learning experience, drive to give faculty the professional development opportunities they need to enhance and perfect their craft, and his utmost commitment to making Park the best school it can be have all left a powerful and lasting

# The Park School

Earlier this fall, following months of evaluating and interviewing many impressive individuals who were excited by the prospect of leading The Park School, the Search Committee selected three candidates to advance as finalists for Park's next Head of School.

In mid-October, the Park community welcomed these educators to campus for two-day interviews.

Michael Robinson, head of Lake Forest Country Day School in Lake Forest, Illinois, visited on Oct. 10 and 11.

Gregory Schneider, head of Berwick Academy in Berwick, Maine, visited on Oct. 15 and 16.

Amy Purcell Vorenberg, head of The Philadelphia School in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, visited on Oct. 17 and 18.

The candidates met with a broad representation of the Park community including faculty, alumni and parents. Each canidate atended two open community conversations as well. The Search Committee encouraged everyone who met with the candidates to voice their impressions in an anonymous online survey.

The Search Committee will take this feedback into consideration when they meet to make a recommendation to the Board. The Board of Trustees will announce Park's 12th Head of School in early November 2013. He or she will begin on July 1, 2013.
